



Woodroe Woods School COVID Safety Plan



NOTE: Document revised *October 27, 2021*. All revisions meet or exceed current Alameda County Public Health Department (ACPHD) guidelines.

Woodroe Woods School COVID Safety Plan (“CSP”) aims to clearly define our school’s ongoing efforts to mitigate the risks of COVID-19 on our campus and within our school community. This plan was designed to be flexible and adaptable to meet the needs and conditions that may fall beyond the control of our school given the fluidity of the virus and its ever-changing information. With this in mind, we have thoughtfully developed a comprehensive CSP in accordance with current directives, guidance and data from the [Alameda County Department of Public Health](#) (ACDPH), [California Department of Public Health](#) (CDPH), [Alameda County Office of Education](#) (ACOE), and the [State of California](#). As guidance changes, this document will be regularly reviewed and updated accordingly.

The health and safety of our school community will always be our top priority. Establishing these enhanced health and safety standards will allow our school community to work together successfully to implement in-person instruction. All families and staff are required to familiarize themselves with our plan and our school [Sick Policy](#), as it is a part of the COVID-19 Addendum to the school year Admission Agreement. We maintain the right to enforce stricter policies to maintain the health and safety of our school community as we deem safe. We will continue to assess conditions on an ongoing basis to determine the best/safest practice.

All members of the Woodroe Woods community are expected to embrace and adhere to the CSP and our school Sick Policy as outlined in the pages below. We greatly appreciate your understanding, support, and resilience as we continue to adapt, improve and troubleshoot. Despite these challenging circumstances, we are wholeheartedly committed to following these best practices to help curtail the transmission of COVID-19. We cannot do it alone, and it will take our collective efforts to be accountable for protecting the health and safety of your child(ren) and the school community.

Woodroe Woods' Community Commitment

1. Protect Myself. Monitor for any symptoms of COVID-19 and immediately notify the school if I or my child experience any COVID related symptoms and consult a medical professional. Wash my hands often with soap and water, or use hand sanitizer as necessary. Wear a double layered fabric or paper face mask that covers my mouth and nose. Keep my circle of exposure limited and consistent. Refrain from attending large public gatherings and avoid nonessential travel. If eligible, get vaccinated for both: COVID-19 and influenza. **Stay up to date with school protocols** and both local/state guidance.
2. Protect Others. Maintain appropriate physical distancing, especially in closed space settings or around the presence of older members of the community. **STAY HOME** if I feel ill or have been exposed to someone who is ill or has tested positive for COVID-19. Follow all school protocols. Refrain from registering my child in more than 1 extracurricular activity.
3. Protect my Community. Uphold Woodroe Woods' CSP and get tested immediately for COVID-19 if symptoms arise. Link to free testing sites within Alameda County: <https://covid-19.acgov.org/testing#midcounty>. Testing is also available through your family's designated healthcare provider.

Cleaning, Disinfection & Ventilation

1. High Touch Surfaces. All high touch surfaces are cleaned/disinfected regularly with an EPA approved disinfectant. This includes but is not limited to: door handles, light switches, desks/tables/countertops, toilets, faucets/sinks, shared equipment. All disinfectants are used per product label, which typically includes a minimum contact time to ensure proper disinfection.
2. Daily Operations. Staff and faculty are responsible for cleaning and disinfecting all areas/shared items throughout the day as needed. Students are responsible for the upkeep of their personal space and belongings.

3. Laundry. Soiled items including towels, are laundered on site in hot water. Disposable gloves are worn and properly disposed of in a trash receptacle, and hands are promptly washed with soap and water. Personal items including soiled masks and clothing are sent home with the student to be laundered.
4. In-house Services. Janitorial staff clean and disinfect our classrooms after hours, each evening upon closure (5 days per week). Restock of essential supplies (paper towels, soap, hand sanitizer, toilet paper, etc.) are fulfilled by Cintas, once a week and as needed before student/staff arrival. Additional stock of PPE and cleaning supplies are readily available on site at all times.
5. Maximize airflow. Teachers will keep doors and windows open throughout the day to increase natural air flow and ventilation in the classroom as well as utilize HVAC systems and fans for air circulation. Exceptions can be made due to instructional needs, and or if other health/safety risk(s) are present, i.e.: air quality, weather conditions, etc. HVAC filters are cleaned monthly and replaced as needed.

Face Coverings and Essential Protective Gear

1. Face Masks. All students are required to wear a clean, well fitted paper or fabric mask with 2 or more layers (except when eating and/or drinking, napping, or taking a designated mask break). Gators, face bandanas and masks with exhaust valves or vents are not permitted. Parents/caregivers, staff and visitors must wear a face covering at all times while present on campus.
2. Personal Protective Equipment. Depending on the situation, staff may occasionally wear other forms of personal protective equipment (PPE) such as gloves, scrubs, or face shields. Please talk to your children about this requirement and help us diffuse any anxiety around the use of PPE.

Face Shields. If a student is unable to wear a face covering due to a special set of circumstances (i.e. a developmental or medical diagnosis) which consequently limits their ability to wear a face covering, the exception to use a well fitted face shield is permitted. Per the ACPHD, a cloth drape must be securely fixed to the bottom of the face shield, and long enough to be secured by either tucking the excess cloth into the

neckline of a shirt or tied around the back of the neck. All exceptions will be considered on a case by case basis.

Health Screenings for Students & Staff

1. Symptoms. Prior to coming to school, all students and staff are required to self-screen at home. This includes completing the [Cleared4School](#) web based app to verify that your student is healthy, feeling well and is free of any COVID-19 symptoms. Take a daily screenshot of your child(ren)'s CLEARED status and have it ready to show at check-in. If any symptom(s) are noted, (including a positive COVID-19 exposure/test result), all household members must stay home until all requirements to return to school have been met. Please refer to our Sick Policy.
2. Arrival. Each day the student attends the program, the parent/caregiver is required to show proof of a cleared status through [Cleared4School](#) before a student is permitted to enter the classroom. A visual well check will be conducted, and various health screening questions may be asked at random. Students who fail to meet these requirements will not be accepted into care. **Cleared4School** web link: <https://app.cleared4school.com/login>
3. Monitoring. Both staff and students will be monitored throughout the day for signs of illness. Children with a fever of 100 degrees or higher, cough, or other COVID-19 symptom(s) will be isolated from the general room population, and parent(s)/caregiver(s) will be immediately notified. Face covering will remain on at all times. Exhibited symptoms/relevant information will be documented for administrative reference. Student confidentiality will be maintained as required by FERPA & HIPAA. Please refer to [Woodroe's Sick Policy](#) (located on page 9).

Healthy Hygiene Practices

1. Best Practices. Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands. Avoid handshakes, high fives or other such physical contact with others. Wash hands with soap and water, frequently, for a minimum of 20 seconds. If soap and water

are not readily available, use hand sanitizer with a minimum of 60% isopropyl alcohol. Cover all surfaces of your hands and rub them together until they feel dry. (Note: frequent and proper hand washing is more effective than the use of hand sanitizer.)

2. Students. All students are required to wash their hands promptly upon their arrival. Teachers will monitor that students are washing their hands thoroughly.

3. Frequency. Students will be directed and encouraged to wash their hands frequently with soap and water throughout the day (i.e. prior to any transition) and as needed.

4. Etiquette. Proper etiquette for hand washing techniques, coughing and sneezing will be incorporated into the classroom curriculum. Signs have been posted throughout the campus in each classroom and at all handwashing stations.

5. Classrooms. All classrooms are equipped with approved surface disinfectants, gloves, both cloth and paper towels, tissues, soap and hand sanitizer dispensers.

6. Access to Water. Easily accessible sinks for handwashing are available in every classroom. All drinking fountains have been disabled as an extra precaution to prevent additional risk of droplet transfer. Students and staff are to bring a labeled water bottle to school each day. Extra water bottles are readily available in case a student forgets to bring one from home; labeled prior to issue and is disinfected/sanitized at the end of the day after use.

On Campus Protocol

1. Plan ahead. Allow for ample time to arrive to school. Due to the new daily intake procedures, be advised that there may be delays at check-in. Be patient and practice safe distancing.
2. Limited campus entry. Parents/caregivers are allowed on campus, however entry into any classroom or the office is not permitted. Families must wait at the designated drop off/pick up areas for a staff member to accept your child for intake into their classroom. Please follow staff's directions/school protocol. Remain outside the play and patio areas when children are present. You are welcome to walk your student right up to the classroom door when the patios are empty.
3. Group size. To limit exposure and lessen the amount of people on campus, only one adult per family is permitted to enter the campus for drop off or pick up. Designated adult must hold child(ren)'s hand(s) until safely with their group/in the car. Groups or parties larger than one are not currently permitted without prior authorization.
4. Supervision. Children may not be left unattended at any time. Parent/caregivers must escort and pick up their child(ren) directly to and from their class. Students cannot walk themselves to class.

Travel Policy

Travel outside of California. Children are considered "unvaccinated". If traveling outside of the state, whether domestic or international, students must take a **PCR/Molecular COVID test** 3-5 days AFTER their return to California. Proof of their negative results must be email to, and approved by the office before they are allowed to attend school. Please note your travel destination and dates of travel along with the test results. Note: test must include the child's first & last name and date the test was taken. For those who choose not to get tested and or display any symptoms, a 7 day quarantine is required. Date of return to California is "day zero"; the first full day back is day 1, etc. Antigen/at home tests results are not accepted. Please inquire with Woodroe administration with any questions.

Testing of Staff

Exposure. Any staff member that may have potentially been exposed to COVID-19 must notify administrative personnel/COVID Liaison via email or phone and stay home. Return to work is not permissible until written documentation of a negative COVID test is presented or the mandatory isolation period has been met. Please reference our school Sick Policy.

Staff Training

1. Staff. Train and communicate to all staff, our current policies and practices as outlined in the CSP and sick policy, which is readily accessible to all via our website.
2. Review of Practice. Administrative team will regularly evaluate the workplace for compliance with the plan and document and correct any deficiencies identified.
3. Family Education. All COVID related communication/education materials/updates are emailed directly to our families. An addendum to the Admission Agreement for the 2020-2021 and 2021-2022 school year also outlines the changes in policy including required acknowledgement of the CSP. The majority of communication with families will be done via email (including PDF attachments), phone, and or video calls.

Identification & Tracing of Contacts

1. Self-Report. Staff and families are required to self-report symptoms. Confidentiality will be maintained as required by FERPA & HIPAA.
2. Confirmed Case. Our designated COVID Liaisons will notify ACPHD, safelearning@acgov.org; (510) 268-2101, if there is a confirmed case of COVID-19 within our school community. Liaisons will monitor and work directly with ACPHD in contact tracing (including completion of all required documentation) and determine the next steps. Liaisons are also responsible for prompt communication to inform parents and staff of a positive case/potential exposure via email/phone.

3. Identification. Identify individuals of possible exposure who have been in close contact - within six feet for a combined 15 minutes or more of an infected person and take steps to promptly isolate COVID-19 positive person(s) and any close contacts.
4. Isolation. Outdoor quarantine tent/cot is available for any potential COVID-19 case(s)/exposed individuals until individual(s) can be taken home/to a healthcare facility.
5. Notify. Parent/caregiver will immediately be notified of student's symptoms & will be required to be taken home within an hour's time. 911 will be contacted for serious circumstances.
6. Contain. Any areas used by any individual(s) suspected of exposure will be closed off until properly cleaned and disinfected. Deep clean/disinfect.
7. Tracing. Investigate any COVID-19 illness and determine if any school related factors could have contributed to risk of infection. Implement the necessary processes and protocols, in accordance with CDPH guidelines.
8. Document. Information/details will be gathered, documented, and archived. Confidentiality will be maintained as required by FERPA & HIPAA.
9. Check In. Potential/confirmed individuals will be followed up with and monitored via phone/email. Reminder of policy to safely return will be issued.

NOTE: Woodroe's Sick Policy is applicable to ALL enrolled students in our Early Education and Elementary programs (Updated *October 27, 2021*). All revisions meet or exceed current Alameda County Public Health Department (ACPHD) guidelines.

Note to Woodroe Woods Families Regarding Our School's Sick Policy:

The health and safety of our students and school community is our top priority. Accordingly, Woodroe has established our school's Sick Policy to align with or exceed guidance provided by the [Alameda County Department of Public Health](#) (ACDPH), [California Department of Public Health](#) (CDPH), and the [State of California](#). Until we see a steady decrease in case rates and less risk around the Delta variant or other harmful strains of COVID, Woodroe will continue to maintain our stricter policies and protocols that we feel best keep our students safe. Out of an abundance of precaution, we will continue to maintain more rigid standards/policies until we feel that it is safe for our school community to reconsider loosening our school's policies around illness. As guidance changes, this document will be regularly reviewed and updated accordingly.

Since the onset of the pandemic, we have strived to do what we can to mitigate the risk of Covid within our program and local community in an effort to keep our student body safe. This would not be possible without the partnership, support and transparency that we have with our families. We truly cannot thank each and every one of you enough for being proactive, taking an abundance of precaution, being transparent, mindful, and vigilant while at or away from our campus. Together, we will continue to do what we can to allow our students a safe place to learn, play, and socialize regardless of these challenging times.

Contagious Illnesses or Conditions

All contagious illnesses or conditions, including but not limited to: pink eye, strep throat, hand-foot-and-mouth disease, pinworms, lice, impetigo, whooping cough, fifth disease, etc. ***must be reported to the office immediately.*** Parents are required to follow a separate protocol as directed by office administration. A physician's note that states an authorized date to safely return to school is required.

Student Absence

Woodroe Administration must be notified of all absences or late arrivals, including, but not limited to: travel, vacation, illness, scheduled appointments, family day, etc.

- Provide a reason of absence (advance notice if possible)
- If out due to illness, all exhibited symptom(s) (ex: temperature **100°F or higher**) must be reported
- Contact and consult your child's physician for guidance if your child exhibits any symptoms, including if a COVID-19 test is appropriate
- Regardless of the results of a negative Covid test, if your child is sick/ill, they should remain at home until they are well enough to attend a full day of school.

Definitions of Frequently Used Terms

Medical Professional is defined as a Physician, Nurse Practitioner, or Certified Physician
Isolation separates sick people with a contagious disease from people who are not sick.

Quarantine keeps someone who might have been exposed to COVID-19 away from others.

Close Contact is anyone who was within 6 feet of a COVID positive person for 15 minutes or longer (this includes multiple shorter periods in the same day that add up to 15 minutes) **EVEN IF** both contacts were masked. Note: In some school situations, it may be challenging to determine if individuals have met these criteria, and an entire cohort, classroom, or group may need to be consider exposed. This is especially true if time together was spent indoors.

COVID-19 Symptoms

There are varying symptoms of COVID-19 ranging from mild to severe illness. Symptoms may appear anywhere from mild to severe illness. Symptoms may appear anywhere from 2-14 days after exposure to the virus. Due to the fluidity of the pandemic, this list of symptoms is continually changing.

As of 9/10/2021 our symptoms list entails all of the following:

***If any symptoms are exhibited, your child(ren) are required to STAY HOME.**

Return to school depends on completion of requirements outlined below.

Observation of Symptoms

The onset of any symptoms listed will automatically prohibit your child(ren) from attending school. If any of these symptoms are noted at school, your child(ren) will be sent home. This includes a visual wellness check conducted by staff, regardless if the parent says that the student is well/has no symptoms. Students sent home from school will be quarantined and must be picked up within 1 hour of notification. Emergency contact(s) will be contacted if a parent/guardian is unable to be reached. *In addition, students are to remain home when any member of the household (i.e.: parent/sibling) has a FEVER or exhibits a combination of more than one COVID-19 symptom. A negative PRC test from the household member must be submitted for the student to return safely to the program.

What To Do If My Child Exhibits Symptoms

1. Contact Woodroe administration immediately to notify the office of observed symptom(s)
2. Provide the date that the symptom(s) first appeared and disclose if there has been a potential or actual exposure
3. Schedule a **PCR/Molecular test** through your medical provider or local testing site (Note: A formal physician's note for pre-existing conditions/diagnosis is required, and will be kept on file for documentation purposes as a conditional exception; **antigen tests are not accepted and negative results will be declined**)

At School Sickness Protocol

1. Both staff and students will be monitored throughout the day for signs of illness, including conducting a wellness check during morning drop off.
2. Children with a fever of 100°F degrees or higher, cough (including a new uncontrolled cough that causes different breathing and/or a change in baseline cough for students with asthma/medically diagnosed allergies), or other COVID-19 symptom(s) as listed will be isolated from the general room population, and parent(s)/caregiver(s) will be immediately notified.
3. Face covering will remain on at all times.
4. Student must be picked up within an hour from the time of notification.
5. Exhibited symptoms/relevant information will be documented for administrative reference.
6. Follow protocol below to return.

Travel Guidance, Outside of California

Children are considered "unvaccinated". 3-5 days AFTER return to California, child(ren) must take a PCR/Molecular COVID test and receive a NEGATIVE test result before returning to the program. Results must be emailed to the office and include the child's first & last name and date the test was taken. For those who choose not to get tested and/or display any symptoms, a 7 day quarantine is required. Date of return to California is "day zero"; the first full day back is counted as day 1, etc.

NOTE: Only **PCR/molecular** test results are sufficient proof for school return. Any tests that are NOT **PCR/molecular** tests will be declined (this includes results for a rapid antigen test). Even without symptoms, vaccinated people are encouraged to test 3-5 days after their exposure to a Covid-19 case.

Confirmed Case of COVID-19 on Campus

1. COVID Liaisons will notify health officials immediately

2. Follow plan of action and implement the necessary processes and protocols, in accordance with CDPH guidelines.
3. Notify families and staff immediately via email.
 - Confidentiality will be maintained
4. Arrange for immediate deep cleaning and disinfection of the classroom/space.

3 Scenarios to Return Safely to the Program:

Scenario 1: If the student's COVID-19 **PCR/molecular** test is positive OR student is **NOT** tested

1. A minimum of 10 days (14 days is recommended) have passed since symptoms first appeared, **AND**
2. It has been at least 24 hours with no fever, without the aid of fever reducing medicines (including acetaminophen [Tylenol] or ibuprofen [Advil or Motrin]), **AND**
3. Other symptom(s) are improving, **AND**
4. Your family has received verbal or written clearance to return.

A doctor's note is not required for return following the 10 day quarantine period.

Scenario 2: Student is **NOT** tested but had a physician evaluation & medical clearance

- Symptoms have resolved, **AND**
- A physician letter is provided that indicates:
 1. An alternative diagnosis **AND**
 2. Must include the statement that "the symptoms are **NOT** due to COVID-19

Scenario 3: Student's **PCR/molecular** test is **NEGATIVE**

- Students can return before the 10 day quarantine period with proof of a current **NEGATIVE PCR/molecular** test result, **AND**
- Symptom(s) have improved
 - If student had a fever of **100°F** or higher: At least 24 hours have passed with no fever, without the aid of fever reducing medicines (including acetaminophen [Tylenol] or ibuprofen [Advil or Motrin]).

Requirements to Return to School Due to an Actual or Possible COVID-19 Exposure:

Household or Individual Exposure

An automatic isolation period of 10 days minimum is required following the last household contact or close contact with the person in question as long as the student does not develop new symptoms. A period of 14 days of quarantine is the safest option.

- A COVID-19 test should be obtained if a student develops new symptoms within the 10 day period
- New onset of symptoms means that the 10 day quarantine period must be restarted and is to be reported to Woodroe administration
- A small number of people should isolate for 20 days when told to do so by their doctor.

Modified Quarantine (Elementary Program, Grades K-5 only)

Per the California Department of Public Health (CDPH), *modified* quarantine is when asymptomatic K-12 students who are unvaccinated, remain in school after an on campus exposure because the student and the individual with COVID-19 are wearing masks appropriately.

Woodroe's Modified Quarantine Plan as of 10/27/21: Grades K-5 only

Any unvaccinated students in our K-5 Elementary program who have been designated as a close contact (more than 15 minutes over a 24-hour period within 0-6 feet) while masked, may undergo a *modified quarantine*, which allows students to continue to attend school for in-person instruction if they:

1. Are asymptomatic (exhibit zero Covid symptoms);
2. Continue to appropriately mask, as required;
3. Undergo molecular/PCR testing at least twice during the quarantine period by day 3 and on day 5 (**antigen tests will not be accepted**; reference testing details below); **AND**
4. Continue to quarantine from extracurricular activities including sports, and activities within a group and/or community setting (i.e.: birthday parties, playdates, and gatherings).

NOTE: Siblings of close contacts are no longer impacted by quarantine restrictions unless a member of the household tests positive. A minimum 10 day quarantine is required for all confirmed cases, which includes all members of the household. The modified option is not applicable for positive cases. The quarantine timeline is extended if new symptoms and/or additional positive cases within the household occur.

How do we ensure continued safety?

Data from around the country demonstrates that when both parties are wearing facemasks appropriately at the time of a school-based exposure to COVID-19, in-school transmission is unlikely and students can safely continue in-person learning as long as they continue to test negative. Modified quarantine provides an additional layer of safety and monitoring. As stated in the 4 criteria, the student must be asymptomatic (exhibit zero symptoms). In addition, close contacts must test negative twice within the modified 7 day quarantine (see attached quarantine timeline). Testing is required immediately (within the first 3 days of exposure) and again on day 5. Modified quarantine ends on day 8, however families must continue to monitor for symptoms until day 14. This allows for less missed days of school and supports in-person education. Should we go into quarantine again, specific testing dates will be given to all families affected. All results must be submitted immediately upon receipt for verification from office staff. In accordance with ACPHD, all abnormal, inconclusive and positive antigen/PCR test results are automatically classified as a positive case, despite alternative findings thereafter.

Woodroe will continue to require students to be masked while outdoors, and classes will be kept separate while eating snacks or meals. Frequent cleaning and sanitizing is conducted on high touch surfaces in classrooms throughout the day, as well as sanitizing our outdoor equipment in between each group's use.

Additional layer of safety outside of school

While a modified quarantine allows students to continue in-person instruction, per county guidelines, students must refrain from all extracurricular activities including sports, and activities within the community setting (including but not limited to baseball, soccer, basketball, playdates, etc.) for 7 days according to the last date of potential exposure. For families who choose **NOT** to forego extracurricular/community activities during modified quarantine, the standard **10 day quarantine at home will apply**. Please do not put our school community in the position to report a family for breaking modified quarantine.

Frequency of testing for students in modified quarantine

It is recommended to test as soon as a person is informed that they were a close contact of someone with COVID-19 (within the first 3 days). Subsequent testing must occur on or after Day 5 from the date of last exposure. Quarantine can end after Day 7 if both the first and second test results are negative. Modified quarantine ends on Day 8, with the go ahead to resume all normal activities. At this time, on campus testing is not currently available. If test results are not received by the quarantine release date (Day 8), the student will remain in quarantine until the negative test results are received and approved by the office, **or** Day 11, whichever comes first.

For Covid Positive student(s) and sibling(s): Transition to online learning during 10⁺ day quarantine

For any positive case/household under an automatic 10 day quarantine, a designated prep period will be allotted to our Elementary teachers to prepare student work and a virtual meeting schedule. Student work will be available for pick up within 24-48 hours of notifying the office of a positive Covid results (not including weekends). Parent(s) will be notified when work is ready with details of where to pick up the packet on campus. Contact the office to request a scanned and emailed packet if you are unable to pick up due to quarantine restrictions. Teachers will make every effort to continue with scheduled curriculum while accommodating virtual learners. Virtual schedules will be subject to change based on the number of students absent, including any siblings affected within the Covid positive household. At a minimum, students will be provided with three virtual online meetings per day during quarantine, in addition to independent work and spiral review. It is the parent's responsibility to inform the teacher if their child is not well enough to participate online (sessions will not be recorded) with a plan to join later, or if you plan to work at home independently. Quarantine Timelines



10-Day At-Home (Standard) Quarantine

Applies To:

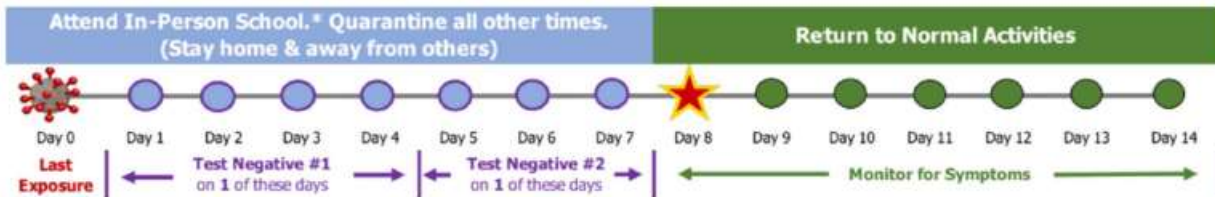
- COVID positive student
- Any student who is ineligible for Modified Quarantine (i.e.: has symptoms, participates in extracurricular activities, cannot stay appropriately masked)



7-Day⁺ In-School (Modified) Quarantine

Who is eligible?

- UNVACCINATED close contact students in K-12
- Must be ASYMPTOMATIC
- Are not participating in extracurricular or community activities (7 day period)



REQUIREMENTS:

- Test as soon as possible after learning about the exposure.
- Test negative on or after Day 5 required to release from quarantine as early as Day 8.
- Students who do not meet the testing timeline or who break the modified quarantine criteria must stop attending in-person class & switch to 10-day (Standard) Quarantine
- Students who find out late that they were exposed should calculate quarantine from their exposure date and meet test requirements from that point forward
- Students who develop COVID-19 symptoms or test positive during quarantine must isolate immediately.**

- ✓ Students in Modified Quarantine may attend before & after school programs located on their own school campuses. No sports. No participation in any other extracurricular or community activities. Stay home & away from others.
- ✓ If test results are not received by the quarantine release date (Day 8), the student will remain in quarantine until the negative test results are received and approved by the office, or Day 11, whichever comes first.
